In the lively core of Kathmandu, surrounded by the resonant chimes of temple bells and the fragrant wafts of incense, a masked figure surges through the alleys annually, evoking a profound sense of wonder and exhilaration among both children and adults. The Majipa Lakhey, known as the "peaceful demon" of Kathmandu, engages in a ritualistic dance — the Lakhey Naach — which stands as one of the most iconic and enigmatic manifestations of Nepal's intangible cultural heritage. Conducted each year amidst the festivities of Indra Jatra, the Majipa Lakhey Naach transcends mere street theatre. This practice embodies a dynamic ritual, serving as a collective remembrance and a narrative of myth, reflecting the enduring cultural

richness of the Newar community. Today, akin to numerous traditional art forms deeply embedded in spiritual and communal practices, it confronts significant challenges regarding its continuity, relevance, and authenticity within an increasingly modernised society.

#### **Mythology and Origins**

The Lakhey is regarded as a rakshasa, a demon found within the mythologies of both Hinduism and Buddhism. In contrast to the terrifying entities often depicted in popular narratives, the Majipa Lakhey serves as a guardian of goodwill. The designation "Majipa" pertains to the historical district of Kathmandu, known as Yen or Yambu in the Newar vernacular. As per the tale, the demon became enamoured with a

maiden from Majipa and resolved to establish his residence in the city. In return for granting him refuge, the local monarch exacted a pledge from him to safeguard the children and cleanse the city of other nefarious entities.

Thus commenced the tradition of the Majipa Lakhey — the entity that performs a dance to safeguard the city. The narrative embodies profound allegorical significance: the metamorphosis of untamed energies into nurturing guardians via communal involvement and ritualistic dedication.

The Majipa Lakhey Naach presents a captivating and dynamic display. Adorned in a

striking red mask characterised by prominent eyes, sharp fangs, and an imposing crown of flames, the Lakhey navigates the alleys of Kathmandu with visceral howls and erratic motions. His imposing stature is adorned with flowing red silk attire that billows dramatically as he twirls, thunders, and advances with purpose. Concealed beneath the mask is a skilled dancer — invariably male — hailing from the Ranjitkar lineage, the traditional guardians of the Lakhey.

The dance embodies both physical rigour and profound spiritual meaning. The performer is required to enter a state akin to trance, as the mask is regarded as sacred and infused with profound power. Lakhey is joined by musicians wielding traditional instruments such as the dhime (drum), bhusya (cymbals), and basuri

(flute), producing a sonic tempest that reflects the tumult and release inherent in the dance.

The arrival of the Lakhey at Hanuman Dhoka, accompanied by his fervent pursuit of the Pulukishi, the white elephant mount of Indra, serves as a profound representation of his function in dispelling malevolence. For children, the presence of the Lakhey evokes a sense of both fear and excitement — a performance that straddles the boundary of the otherworldly.

The Lakhey Naach serves as a profound expression of cultural identity and the continuity of tradition. Executed amidst Indra Jatra — a festival of paramount importance in the Kathmandu Valley — it forges a link between the contemporary urban cadence and its legendary heritage. It strengthens the bonds within the Newar community and underscores their cultural and historical significance to the identity of Kathmandu.

The dance serves as an opportunity for the exchange of knowledge across generations. From a tender age, young boys belonging to the Ranjitkar community are instructed in the intricate rhythms, postures, and profound significance of their

traditional dance. The transmission of musical skills, mask-making traditions, and the upkeep of costumes occurs through oral traditions, thereby safeguarding the heritage of the Lakhey lineage. However, these traditions possess a certain delicacy. The younger generation, captivated by contemporary careers and lifestyles, increasingly discover a scarcity of time or motivation to engage in these practices. The rigorous physical conditioning, confidentiality, and strict discipline demanded of a Lakhey dancer do not readily correspond with modern ambitions.

# The Ritual Preparation and the Sacred Mask

The mask stands at the heart of the Majipa Lakhey tradition, embodying

profound cultural and spiritual importance. Constructed from papier-mâché and fabric, augmented with multiple layers of resin, and adorned in vibrant colours, the mask is revered as a divine entity. It resides within a designated shrine, the Lakhey Guthi, and is exclusively unveiled during festive occasions.

Prior to the performance, the dancer engages in a series of ritualistic preparations, encompassing fasting, purification, and, in certain instances, prayer ceremonies.

Access to the mask is restricted to a privileged few, and the metamorphosis from human to Lakhey is regarded as a manifestation of possession — an intertwining of the dancer's essence with the safeguarding power of the demon. The gradual erosion of these rituals is a consequence of the relentless demands of time and practicality. In times past, elders had the luxury of dedicating weeks to meticulously prepare for the performance; however, contemporary participants frequently find themselves fitting rehearsals into the interstices of work commitments or academic obligations.





Beyond its visual grandeur, the Majipa Lakhey Naach fulfils a profound social purpose. It underscores the significance of communal bonds, the reverence of mythological narratives, and the profound impact of ritualistic practices. By embodying the "peaceful demon," the dance implies that that which is feared can be embraced, transformed, and revered. This art form is fundamentally paradoxical — it embodies a protective rage, a chaotic blessing, and masks that unveil deeper truths. Thus,



बच्चों को राखी बनाने की कला सिखाई। इस दौरान बच्चों को मुफ्त में ड्रॉइंग मटीरियल दिया गया। जिसमें उन्हें संस्था के बॉलंटियर्स द्वारा राखी के डिजाइन बनाना सिखाया गया। इसके बाद इन डिजाइन को कट करके इस पर गते की परत से मोटा बनाया गया और फिर इन्हें धागों से चिपकाया गया। वर्कशॉप के दौरान 20 बच्चों ने हिस्सा लिया, जो आसपास के मजदूरों को बच्चे हैं। पीएनए पपेट थिएटर से जुड़े
